drums.

You hold the sticks out in front of you and hold the sticks with your thumb and fingers. Then you outstretch your arms to the ceiling, then down in front of your face using one stick and then bang the drums. You raise one hand and then you would raise the other hand.



When they play the drums, they shout words which reminds me of Japanese karate. These are calls of encouragement to other players who are playing on the drums.



They played to different beats and rhythm but they made a nice sound although very loud, it was enjoyable and fun. Pupils really enjoyed being involved.






"Many years ago, I worked as an assistant English teacher in Japan for two years. So, it was wonderful to be able to share my experiences with some of our students in their English lessons. We looked at a map of Japan and saw the four main islands of Japan -Honshu, Hokkaido, Kyushu and Shikoku. Using a powerpoint, I showed them some photos of the cherry blossom in Japan which is very important in Japanese culture. I talked about how different the houses are in Japan - so instead of carpets, traditional Japanese houses have tatami mats, made of grass. Japanese people also never wear outdoor shoes inside their houses, instead they take them off in the entrance hall. I also showed students origami cranes I'd made and later made some with my tutor group, 12F. They also learnt a bit of Japanese - though as I reminded them, they already know some Japanese words, for example origami, karaoke, karate, sushi, futon!"

"The development of technology in Japan is world leading with many of the tech giants headquarters being in Japan. This includes Sony, Nintendo, Canon and Toshiba. We concentrated on the robotics side of technology, especially how in the car industry, the use of robotics has increased car production from 1 car a day to 1,000 cars a day.

We were lucky enough to use a Lego robot who used sensors to follow a black line. Pupils were able to design their own circuit for the robot to follow with straight lines and curves.

Mr Goodchild brought in his drone and demonstrated to 9N and 8B how the technology worked and took a video over the top of school. We replayed the video on the IWB so everyone could see the top of the school roof and discovered we had solar panels up there".






































