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

The subjects shown below are all part of our core curriculum and are subjects all students at Alderman Knight School Post 16 Centre will study as part of their Key Stage 5 curriculum.

English and Maths - If students achieve a Grade 4 or above in the summer examinations, they will not need to continue with these subjects. If they do not achieve Grade 4, then they will need to retake these subjects.



What qualifications will the core subjects give me?



At AKS all of the qualifications we offer at Post-16, KS5 are at Level 2 (GCSE or equivalent).

Overview

A Level 2 Employability course is designed to equip students with essential skills and knowledge to enhance their employability in a variety of workplace settings



GCSE English Language



Overview

In the GCSE English course, students will be expected to undertake 3 separate parts of the qualification: Reading, Writing and Speaking and Listening. The course is assessed through examinations at the end of the course. Students will read a range of texts including poetry, plays and pre/post 20th Century fiction as well as non-fiction texts.

What current students have said?

I love English, it is fantastic! I learn so much and really enjoy all the different texts we get to read.

Why English?

An English GCSE will enable students to develop their understanding of different literary devices, ranging from punctuation for effect to pathetic fallacy to create atmosphere. They will write for a range of audiences and purposes including creative writing and non-fiction texts such as a persuasive letter.

What you will learn about...

Students will learn how to use language for effect and create a response in their target audience. They will develop their research skills and presentation skills in the speaking and listening component of the course.

How is GCSE English Assessed?

2 x formal examinations- paper 1 (explorations in creative reading and writing) and paper 2 (writer's viewpoints and perspectives)

-Each exam has a reading section and a writing section. In paper 1, students are given an extract from a fiction text and asked to analyse the language and structure used. The writing in this is creative writing based. In Paper 2, students read two non fiction texts and answer questions based on comparing and contrasting the two. The writing component is based around writing to present a viewpoint, completing a non fiction task.

1x speaking and listening- presenting on a topic of their choosing and responding verbally to questions and feedback



GCSE Mathematics

Overview of the subject

The aims and objectives of the GCSE in Mathematics are to enable students to:

- develop fluent knowledge, skills and understanding of mathematical methods and concepts
- acquire, select and apply mathematical techniques to solve problems
- reason mathematically, make deductions and inferences, and draw conclusions
- comprehend, interpret and communicate mathematical information in a variety of forms.

Qualification overview

The GCSE (9-1) qualification consists of three equally-weighted written examination papers at either Foundation tier or Higher tier. All three papers must be at the same tier of entry and must be completed in the same assessment series.



How is Mathematics assessed?

All assessments are externally marked exams. At the end of year 13 students will have 3 exams all at 1 hour and 30 minutes in length if they take the GCSE.

Preparation For Work Experience

Overview:

Getting you ready to go on work experience during your time within Post-16.

We will look into what essential skills are required before anyone attends a Work placement and which bespoke skills you require.

What you will learn about...

Health and safety in the workplace – what your duties are as an employee under health and safety law, what is a risk assessment?, safe manual handling and the dangers to avoid, fire safety and how to keep yourself safe in a typical workplace.

Hazard awareness in the workplace – what is a hazard and a risk? How to keep others safe at work, awareness of basic safety signs, awareness of PPE and the protection they provide.

Communication Skills – how to ask for help and what to do if something goes wrong, double checking instructions, workplace banter and customs.

Visits to different workplaces.

Confidence and awareness of the workplace

Communication skills, examples of what to say in different situations.

Knowledge of health and safety relevant to a typical workplace. Increased understanding of the world of work.

Personal Social and Health Education (PSHE)

There is no PSHE qualification or accreditation for PSHE at Post-16 but the content is based around the 4 strands of Preparation for Adulthood – Friends, relationships and community, Health, Employment and Independent Living







In Key Stages 2 & 3, pupils will have covered Healthy Lifestyles, Self-Awareness, The World I Live In, Self-Care, Support and Safety, Managing Feelings and Changing and Growing. At Key Stage 4 pupils then take the ASDAN Personal Development accreditation with units such as Healthy Living and Eating, Making the Most of Leisure Time, Parenting Awareness and Preparing for Adulthood (PfA). In Post-16, the emphasis is on enhancing the student's independence, life skills and employability whilst centring the learning around the 14 topics in the 4 PfA areas highlighted above.

Assessment;

- Individual pieces of work around each of the 14 topics plus question and answer sessions on key content
- Evidence is then gathered in students' folders across the two year course



Preparation For Adulthood (PFA)

PFA provides opportunities which support students to build their hopes and aspirations for the future. Value is placed on purposeful activities to enable students to contribute to society. PFA links directly to EHCP outcomes.



Key questions covered

What do I understand about the community around me? What are the benefits of accessing my community? What life skills do I want/need to develop? What are the different options available to me after Post-16? Do I fully understand what the different options involve? Why do I need to be aware of different health providers and how to access them?

What will my lessons look like?

You will have at least 2 PFA lessons a week. You will complete a PFA audit at the start of the year to see which skills are relevant to you to learn. The lessons will be a mixture of theory, practical and community visits. No exams, folder work to achieve AQA Level 2 Unit Award Scheme Certificates.

Timeline of important dates

Once all Year 11 pupils have made their option choices, we will be able to confirm which option subjects have been allocated to each pupil.

If we have any queries about the choices a pupil has made, a member of staff will discuss the situation with that student. All pupils will receive a letter confirming their option choices on the 20th March and will also receive an individualized options booklet which will also outline the core subject accreditations that pupils will be studying.
